I'm a huge fan of Michael McCollum's always-terrific space operas. They rank among my most favorite Sci-Fi which I recommend routinely and without hesitation. They're so much fun that I've read most of them more than once, and if you haven't yet discovered his Gibraltar and Antares trilogies don't stop shopping after you have grabbed this latest work, Euclid's Wall!

In Euclid's Wall, Michael brings us down to Earth, or back to Earth, or stuck on Earth... after an innocent mistake made by a pair of PhD's in the near future (2087) pretty much ends the world as we know it. Whoops! Thus the sailing ship on the book's cover, one hundred years post-catastrophe, as humanity struggles to recreate and rebuild pieces of what has been lost. Lost was the technology required to fly, along with pretty much everything else we take for granted these days. The whole idea is really quite thought provoking and more than a little chilling.

Into this hauntingly plausible future, Michael introduces relatable and engaging characters, then weaves the sort of clever puzzle-plot I have always enjoyed about his novels. Though I finished the book several weeks ago, it has remained with me, a bit haunting, like a recent vivid dream.

If you have an imagination that's usually satisfied by phasors and photon torpedoes -- though you won't find those here -- I believe you'll enjoy this voyage on Michael's high seas every bit as much as I did. I rated this book five stars because I think it deserves every one of them. I'll bet you think so too!
